

## **Privacy Policy**

Hunt & Ayres, P.C. ("H&A") recognizes the importance of and respects your privacy. The following describes the information collection, use and disclosure practices for this website. This policy does not, however, address information that H&A may obtain offline through events such as seminars or from an attorney's personal contacts.

When you visit H&A's website, you remain anonymous. To the extent you use e-mail links via the website to communicate with anyone affiliated with H&A and provide us with personally identifiable information, you will not remain anonymous. Because it is not possible to anticipate every conceivable context in which such information might be provided to us via e-mail, H&A can provide you no assurance that personally identifiable information you choose to provide to us via e-mail will be maintained as private.

H&A and/or the host of its website use "cookies." Cookies are small text files that are placed on a visitor's computer hard drive that allow H&A and/or the host of its website to record how many times a user or computers within a user's network of computers has visited the website and the number of times various pages of the website have been accessed. You may disable receipt of cookies using features of your web browser that disable or turn off cookies. H&A does not use cookies to retrieve information that is unrelated to your visit to or your interaction with the website.

H&A collects your Internet Protocol (IP) address. An IP address is a number that is assigned to your computer when you use the Internet. The IP address data that we collect does not contain any personally identifiable information about you and is used to administer our site, to determine the numbers of different visitors to the site and to gather broad demographic data.

The non-personally identifiable data that H&A collects in these ways is accessible by H&A personnel as well as certain third-party website designers and personnel involved with the third-party service that hosts the website. H&A uses all non-personally identifiable data that it collects internally and together with its website designer and host in order to improve the website. The information is used, for example, to evaluate what portions of the website are more popular than others, to determine from where visitors came to the site, and to determine how many times particular pages of the site were accessed in aggregate.

To the extent permitted by law, H&A will not sell, share, or otherwise disclose any of the information it collects online without your permission. Exceptions are disclosures to third parties who monitor the website. In addition, H&A does not presently collect personally identifiable information from its website except to the extent that such information is provided from visitors who voluntarily send electronic mail to H&A or any of its lawyers.

Due to the rapidly evolving technologies on the Internet, H&A may occasionally update this privacy policy. All revisions will be posted to H&A's website. H&A urges you to review its Privacy Policy frequently.
